Introduction

"DIE kleine BERLIN-STATISTIK
2007" (The small Berlin Statistics
2007) offers information on the
development of the German capital based on the most important
statistical results

Divided into thematic chapters, figures on the demographic, economical, social, cultural, and political structures of the city are presented (Chapters 1 – 27). As far as possible, developments are highlighted by showing the figures of the years: 1998, 2002 and 2006. The brochure also contains information on the city's boroughs (Chapter 28), data on Berlin's development since 1871 (Chapter 29), and an accumulation of figures for the region of Berlin / Brandenburg.

At the end of 2006 Berlin had a population of 3.404 million. In comparison to the beginning of the year, the city's population showed a net gain of 8,850 residents. Thus the trend of population increase continued since 2005. It is the first time since 1997 that the population of Berlin exceeded the number of 3.4 million. The increase was solely caused by immigration. The number of foreign citizens totalled 472,650 and was 6,140 inhabitants or 1.3 percent higher than at the beginning of 2006.

At the end of 2006 there were 1.88 million dwellings in Berlin, 2,439 more than in 2005. The largest numbers of new dwellings were recorded in Pankow (639) and in Treptow-Köpenick (594).

In comparison with 2005 Berlin's accommodation providers reported an increase of 9.5 percent guest arrivals (7.08 million visitors in 2006) and an 8.8 percent increase of overnight stays, 15.91 million in 2006. That was the third record in a row

The gross domestic product (adjusted for prices) increased by 1.9 percent in 2006. All in all, since 2004 the figure has increased slightly but steadily. Especially the retail trade, hotel and restaurant industry caused growth impulses (plus 5.7 percent). However, not all industrial sectors showed better performance in 2006 – for example, the construction industry declined by 1.6 percent.

"DIE kleine BERLIN-STATIS-TIK 2007" gives an initial overview of the data offered by the official statistics. For Brandenburg an analogical brochure is published, named "DIE kleine BRANDENBURG-STATISTIK 2007" (The small Brandenburg Statistics 2007). Those interested also can find a similarly structured selection of figures and data for the Federal Republic of Germany as well as benchmark figures for the German "Länder" in "Key Data on Germany", published on a yearly basis by the Federal Statistical Office



Updated age pyramid on 31 December 2006 by marital status









Information on the economic and social situation of the population is provided by the micro-census. This involves an official annually performed household survey which covers one percent of all households. These households are selected by means of a random mathematical procedure. Interviewers provide information about the survey which is performed on location.






04 Households and Families

Every community of persons living together and forming an economical unit as well as persons who live alone and, nevertheless, manage for themselves are counted as a household (private household). A household may include relatives and persons who do not belong to the family as such (e.g. companions or partners in life). Married couples with children as well as single parents and unmarried couples with their unmarried children living in the same household are counted as families.






Trainees in the ten most frequent training occupations, 31 December 2006, total: 55,334 trainees



The ten most popular kinds of sports, by members of sports associations, 2006







Marie-E.-Lüders-House [7] → Berlin Mitte











Park of Schloß Charlottenburg [10] → Berlin Charlottenburg-Wilmersdorf







Gross monthly earnings of blue-collar workers in production industries, by qualification





27.1 Elections

In voting for the Abgeordnetenhaus von Berlin (House of Representatives), the first vote was cast for direct election of a candidate to one of the 78 constituencies and the second vote was to be used to vote for the state and borough lists of the parties. 27.5 Elections






