»**DIE kleine BERLIN-STATISTIK 2010**« (statistics for the City of Berlin, 2009, key facts and figures) offers information on the development of the German capital based on the most important statistical results.

This document is divided into chapters on different topics. Chapters 1 – 27 present figures on the city's demographic, economical, social, cultural and political structures. As far as possible, developments have been highlighted by including the figures for the years 2001, 2005 and 2009. The document also contains information on the city's boroughs (Chapter 28), data on Berlin's development since 1871 (Chapter 29) and accumulated figures for the region of Berlin / Brandenburg (Chapter 30).

To 31 December 2009 covered the surface of Land Berlin 89,154 hectares. Of it were allotted 62,557 hectare to the settlement and traffic surfaces. Thus the portion of the settlement and traffic surfaces lay for the first time in Berlin over 70 per cent.

Berlin had in the end of 2009 3,442,675 inhabitants. In relation to the conditions of the yearly beginning that was 11,000 persons more. With it since the year 2005 the registered increase in the population continued to continue, although somewhat smaller than in the two previous years. A relatively high loss with the migration movements with the foreign country was to be due in particular to in the year 2009 the accomplished clearing of the population register in connection with the introduction of the tax identification number. Thus for the first time again the foreigner number fell around 7,194 persons and covered at the end of the year 473,209 persons since 1998.

At the end of 2009, there were 1.9 million flats in Berlin, 3,727 more than at the end of 2008. Most of these new flats were built in Pankow (1,187) and Lichtenberg (396).

With approximately 18.87 million overnight stays as well as 8.26 million guests were once again surpassing the figures of the previous year and thereby breaking the record for the sixth time in a row. In the com-

parison to the past record year 2008 the accommodating establishments and camping sites for vacation camping announced 4.5 per cent more arrivals of guest and 6.2 per cent more overnight accommodation than in the year 2008.


The national economy development in Berlin was less coined by the world-wide financial and economic crisis in the year 2009 than in the other Federal states. In Berlin the decrease of the price-settled gross domestic product with 0.7 per cent of all Federal states failed smallest for the last year. The medium-term view of the price-settled economic development shows the fact that itself Land Berlin since the year 2004 constantly even if slightly upward developed and now in the year 2009 a stronger setback to book had. The Berlin construction industry contributed with a growth of 10 per cent to weaken the negative trend in nearly all other economic sectors. Here the effects of the economic situation pact of the Federal Government reflect themselves.

In the year 2009 there were two large elections in Berlin. Beside the members to the Eu-

ropean parliament also the members were selected to the Deutscher Bundestag (German Parliament). The CDU with 22.8 per cent of the secondary votes in Berlin strongest party followed of the party DIE LINKE with 20.2 per cent and the SPD likewise with 20.2 per cent. The SPD had to bear strong voice losses in relation to the last election to the Bundestag however.

»DIE kleine BERLIN-STATISTIK 2010« gives an initial overview of the data provided by official statistics. A brochure along the same lines has been published for Brandenburg (»DIE kleine BRANDENBURG-STATISTIK 2010«). Those interested can also find a similarly structured selection of figures and data for the Federal Republic of Germany as well as benchmark figures for the German »Länder« in the »Pocket-book: Germany«, published by the Federal Statistical Office.







This involves an official, annually performed household survey which covers one percent of all households. These households are selected by means of a random mathematical procedure. Interviewers provide information about the survey which is performed on location.


## 04 Households and Families

■ Single parents









The ten most popular kinds of sports, by members of sports associations, 2009



Death from respiratory system disease











Gross domestic product price-adjusted % change on previous year







## 21 Consumer Prices

The consumer price index shows the monthly development of consumer prices. Thus it is considered to be a general measure of the change in the purchasing power of money. The basis for calculating the index is a commodity basket with approximately 700 goods and services (price representatives). In accordance with their share in the overall expenditures of private households in the respective price base year (here: 2005), they are incorporated into the index calculation with different values (weights).





European elections which took place prior to German Reunification in 1979, 1984 and 1989 the Berlin representatives in the European Parliament were determined






