Introduction

"DIE kleine BERLIN-STATISTIK 2005" offers information on the development of Germany's capital city based on the most important statistical results

Divided into thematic chapters, figures on the demographic, economical, social, cultural, and political structures of the city are presented (Chapters 1 - 28). As far as possible, developments are highlighted by showing the figures of the years 1996, 2000 and 2004. The brochure also contains information on the city boroughs (Chapter 29), data on Berlin's development since 1871 (Chapter 30), and a collection of figures for the region of Berlin/ Brandenburg.

Berlin has a population of 3.388 million people (as at the end of 2004), 455,000 members of the population are foreign citizens. The city's population showed a net loss of approximately 600 inhabitants in comparison to the start of the year, thus the trend of re-

duction in population continued over the past vear. Yet the decline in 2003 - iust under 4.000 people – was considerably higher. The reduction in population was caused by a surplus of deaths over hirths of more than 2,300 people. as opposed to a gain of only around 1,700 people through immigration. Since as early as 1994 the population of Berlin has tended to shrink. This trend was only interrupted shortly in 2001 and 2002.

At the end of 2004 there were 1,879 million dwellings in Berlin, 2,489 or 0.1 percent more than in the year before. The largest number of new dwellings was recorded in Pankow (775) and Treptow-Köpenick (480). In Marzahn-Hellersdorf the number of dwellings declined by 282.

Berlin's accommodation providers recorded approximately 5.92 million visitors and 13.26 million overnight stays during 2004. That is 18.8 percent more guests and 16.1



percent more overnight stays than in the previous year and, thus more than in any other year since the introduction of combined tourism statistics in both parts of Berlin in 1992.

Berlin's gross domestic product, with an increase of 0.5 percent, was slightly above the level of the previous year for the first time since 2000. For the first time in 10 years. there was no decrease in the industry gross value added. The figure remained unchanged, although the construction industry showed a decline of 6.7 percent. The service industry was able to increase its economic performance by 1.0 percent after two years of sinking figures.

In the employment market, a slight reduction in the number of people unemployed was observed in 2004, down to 17.6 percent (2003: 18.1 percent). "DIE kleine BERLIN-STATISTIK 2005" gives an initial overview of the data offered by the official statistics. Those interested can find a similarly structured selection of figures for the Federal Republic of












Updated age pyramid on 31 December 2004, by marital status











Trainees in the ten most frequent training occupations, 31 December 2004, total: 58,787 trainees







Consumer price index change on same month of previous year





Change on same month of previous year



Completion of new buildings Dwelling units, total







Gross monthly earnings of blue-collar workers in production industries, by qualification







28.1 Elections



On 21 October 2001 new early elections took place after the Abgeordnetenhaus von Berlin (House of Representatives) resolved its dissolution on 1 September 2001. At the same time, new elections were held for the 12 Bezirksverordnetenversammlungen (Borough Assemblies). In voting for the Abgeordnetenhaus von Berlin, the first vote was cast for direct election of a candidate to one of the 78 constituencies and the second vote was to be used to vote for the state and borough lists of the respective parties. A total of 55 representatives were selected in the elections for the respective Bezirksverordnetenversammlungen.






