### INTRODUCTORY NOTE

The Statistical Compass is intended for all those who at a glance want to inform themselves on major basic statistics. The inclusion of explanatory texts and graphs should facilitate the understanding of the data material provided, which covers almost all spheres of economic and social life in the Federal Republic of Germany. In addition to selected comparative data for the individual federal Laender, the publication also presents in its appendix the respective latest data on the member countries of the European Communities and the OECD. The present edition contains a substantially enlarged section of information on the German Democratic Republic and Berlin (East), now including also data on such important fields as environmental protection.

This little brochure can of course offer only a small section of the great variety of numerical data available from official statistics. Anyone interested in more detailed information should request a free copy of the comprehensive List of Publications by writing to the Federal Statistical Office or to the publishers Verlag Metzler-Poeschel, Stuttgart.



### THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY

The Federal Republic of Germany is a democratic and social constitutional state on a parliamentary basis. Its Constitution is the "Basic Law" of 23 May 1949. The member states of the Federal Republic are the Laender Schleswig-Holstein, Hamburg, Lower Saxony, Bremen, North Rhine-Westphalia, Hesse, Rhineland-Palatinate, Baden-Württemberg, Bavaria, Saarland and Berlin (West). In Berlin (West), the implementation of the Basic Law is subject to certain restrictions.



Head of State of the Federal Republic of Germany is the Federal President. He represents the Federation in national matters and in its international relations. The Federal President is elected for a five-year term of office by the Federal Convention, specially convened for this purpose. The Federal Convention consists of all members of the Bundestag and an equal number of members elected by the Laender parliaments according to the rules of proportional representation.

Legislative power is vested in the "Bundestag" and the "Bundesrat". The 11th Bundestag comprises 519 members (incl. 1 excess seat of the CDU in Baden-Württemberg), including 22 from Berlin (West). According to the position after the 1987 elections, the Social Democratic Party of Germany (SPD) is represented by 193 members, the Christian Democratic Union of Germany (CDU) by 185, while the Christian Social Union (CSU) has 49, the Free Democratic Party (F.D.P.) 48 and THE GREENS 44 members.

Through the Bundesrat, the Laender participate in the legislation and administration of the Federation. The members of the Bundesrat are appointed by the Laender Governments. The total of 45 voices – including four from Berlin (West) – are divided among the 11 Laender according to the number of inhabitants.

Executive power is vested in the Federal Government. It consists of the Federal Chancellor, who is elected by the Bundestag on the proposal of the Federal President, and the Federal Ministers who are appointed by the Federal President upon the proposal of the Federal Chancellor.

Under the Basic Law, the judicial authority is vested in the judges, with the Federal Constitutional Court occupying a special position. It decides in particular on the interpretation of the Basic Law in the event of constitutional disputes between government organs, on the compatibility of federal and Laender law with the Basic Law (voidance petitions) as well as on complaints lodged by individual citizens in constitutionality matters. Half of its members are elected by the Bundestag, and half by the Bundesrat.



### **POPULATION**

Data on the total number of the population, its social and demographic structure, as well as its spatial distribution are provided by the population censuses (latest on 25 May 1987) conducted at several years' intervals. They at the same time serve as basis for the annual sample surveys of the microcensus and the current adjustment of the number of the population; statistics on foreigners are compiled from the data of the Central Register of Foreigners.



### **EMPLOYMENT**

Data on the labour force participation of the population are provided by the occupational censuses conducted in connection with the population censuses, the annual microcensus, the monthly, quarterly and annual calculations of average employment figures as well as the quarterly evaluations of the statistics of persons employed subject to compulsory social insurance. Data on the situation on the labour market are supplied by the Federal Institute for Employment, Nuremberg.





### PRODUCTION INDUSTRIES

Production industries comprise energy and water supply, mining, manufacturing and building industry; handicrafts are included. The statistics generally cover only enterprises with 20 and more persons engaged; for handicrafts all enterprises are covered. The central part are the monthly reports; further material is provided on a quarterly basis by the reports on handicrafts and the production surveys, and annually by the surveys on investments and the cost structure.



### **BUILDING ACTIVITY AND DWELLINGS**

The housing and building statistics cover the construction scene from the planning stage up to the completion of buildings. In addition to the monthly building reports, data are supplied mainly by the monthly statistics on building activity which provide data on building permits and completions of buildings. Structural data of great detail are derived from the censuses of buildings and housing (latest in 1987); they also serve as a basis for the annual updating of the dwelling stock and provide the sampling frame for the housing sample surveys (latest in 1978).

The system of statistics in the hotel and restaurant industry comprises the censuses of distribution conducted at larger intervals (latest in 1985) covering for all enterprises and establishments in particular turnover and number of persons engaged, as well as monthly and annual sample surveys. The data relating to tourism are derived from the accommodation statistics. The statistics of the Berlin trade as well as the trade in goods with the GDR are based on the evaluation of the waybills.



### **FINANCE AND TAXES**

The finance statistics present a comprehensive picture of the development of public finance. Data on expenditure, revenue and debts of public budgets, as well as of personnel and pensioners of the public service, are shown with differing periodicities and breakdowns. The tax statistics, which are regularly compiled by evaluating the taxation records, provide information on the total amount and structure of tax revenue as well as of the respective assessment bases such as income, capital gains and profits, wealth, turnover, consumption. The annual reports of the local authorities provide regional results on the yield and the assessment bases of the tax on land and buildings and of the trade taxes.



### FAMILY BUDGET SURVEYS AND SUPPLY

The continuous family budget surveys are based on the monthly notations in the household books of approximately 1 000 selected households. They in particular provide information on the sources of income, the expenditure by kinds and objects and the equipment with consumer durables. Additional sample surveys on income and expenditure covering some 55 000 households are conducted at intervals of five years (latest in 1988). Further information on the consumption of food, beverages and tobacco is provided, inter alia, by the excise duty statistics.





The indexes for the prices of individual goods, which are mostly computed with 1985 as base year, are combined for specific spheres and weighted in accordance with their significance in regard to turnover or expenditure. The weighted average of the individual index numbers represents the respective price index.




