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Preface

The Handbook of Statistics for the Federal Republic of Germany, which is published at three years' intervals, presents a selection of the major and most recent figures available from all fields of German official statistics. For users abroad wishing to get figures providing in a concise form a picture of the economic and social conditions in the Federal Republic of Germany, English and French versions have—as in 1961—again been prepared of this 1964 edition which was published a few months ago. These foreign-language versions, while otherwise consistent with the German edition, have been supplemented by including the latest statistical data which have become available in the meantime.

To maintain its character of a handy reference book, this publication has not changed in volume, but it has been diversified as to its contents by substituting data from recent surveys for other and less important information. It is because of the little space available that the tables presenting figures for international comparison have been restricted to some few selected fields.

Users interested in figures of greater detail, both in point of time as well as technically and regionally, will find such information in "Statistisches Jahrbuch für die Bundesrepublik Deutschland" and other publications of the Federal Statistical Office.

Introduction

Sources: Where there is no reference to specific sources, the figures for the period following World War II have been collected by the Federal Statistical Office or the Land statistical offices. The pre-war figures are derived from publications of the former Reich Statistical Office. In all other cases the source is mentioned at the bottom of the table.

Area: Data generally relate to the Federal Republic incl. Berlin (West). As in certain cases the inclusion of the figures for Berlin (West) was not yet possible for technical reasons, mention has been made in a special note to all tables not broken down by Laender, whether Berlin (West) is included or not, so as to avoid any misunderstandings.

Unless otherwise stated, figures for the former German Reich cover the area as of 31 December 1937, i.e. incl. the Saar, but excl. the territories incorporated since 1938.

Rounding of figures: Figures have been rounded without taking account of the totals, so that there may be an apparent slight discrepancy between the sum of the constituent items and the total as shown,

Decomposition of totals: The complete breakdown of a total is indicated by the term "of which". separate recording of only part of the constituent items by "incl.". The term "of which" has not been used where composition of the table as well as heading and stub clearly indicate that the entire sum has been broken down.

Geographical Data

Landscape, Climate, Natural Resources, State Territory

From the North Sea and the Baltic in the north to the Alps in the south, and from the Rheinisches Schiefergebirge in the west to the central chain of mountains in the east, the Federal Republic of Germany excl. Berlin is geographically divided into the following five large parts:

The North German Lowlands south of the coasts of the North Sea and the Baltic with their off-shore islands;

the ridge of the central chain of mountains which comprises, among others, the Rheinisches Schiefergebirge (Hunsrueck, Eifel, Taunus, Westerwald), the Weser and Leine Hills, the Frankenwald, the Fichtel Mountains and the Bohemian Forest:

the terraced and mountainous parts of western and southern Germany with the Black Forest, the Odenwald, the Spessart, the Hardt Mountains and the Alb;

the south German footlands of the Alps with the Swabian-Bavarian tableland, the hill-country of Lower Bavaria and the lowlands of the Danube;

the Alps between the Lake of Constance and Salzburg.

Characteristic features of the climate are precipitations throughout the year, prevailing westerly winds, frequent weather changes and slight seasonal fluctuations of temperatures.

The major natural resources are: hard coal (Aix-la-Chapelle, Ruhr and Saar districts), brown coal (west of Cologne), iron ore (Rheinisches Schiefergebirge, Franconia Mountains, northern footlands of the Harz Mountains), mineral oil (Emsland, Hanover, Schleswig-Holstein), natural gas (North German Lowlands, lowlands of the upper Rhine, Bavarian footlands of the Alps) and potash salt (Lower Saxony, Hesse, South Baden).

The Federal Republic of Germany comprises the ten federal Laender Schleswig-Holstein, Hamburg, Bremen, Lower Saxony, North Rhine-Westphalia, Hesse, Rhineland-Palatinate, the Saar, Baden-Wuerttemberg and Bayaria. Berlin (West), which according to the Basic Law is also a Land of the Federal Republic, has Four-Power status.



I. Area and Population

Explanatory Notes

Only part of the figures were provided by the population censuses, while the others have been obtained by current adjustment of the population.

Resident population: Persons having their permanent residence in the specified area. Persons with living accommodation in several communities have been allocated to the community from which they go to work or to an educational or training institution. Members of foreign armed forces stationed in the Federal Republic incl. Berlin (West), members of foreign diplomatic and consular missions and their families are not included among the resident population.

Expellees: Expellees are holders of the Federal Expellee Identity Card "A" or "B" and the children of such persons.

Germans from the Soviet-occupied zone of Germany: German nationals who are not expelless and moved after the end of the war from the Soviet-occupied zone of Germany or the Soviet-occupied sector of Berlin into the Federal Republic incl. Berlin (West), as well as the children of such persons born after arrival in the Federal Republic Incl. Berlin (West).

Marital status: Women whose husbands are reported missing are considered as married, and those women whose husbands are declared dead as widowed. Since in the case of married persons one of the spouses may have his or her residence outside the Federal Republic, this is the main reason why the figures for married men and women do not entirely coincide.

Religious denomination: Membership of a Church, religious society or political-philosophical community.

Private household: Group of persons living and keeping house together which may comprise both relatives and non-relatives, families in the narrowest and in the broader sense, domestic servants, commercial, industrial or agricultural labour, etc. Persons who live and keep house by themselves, e. g. single subtenants, are also counted as a household. Households of the staff or of inmates of institutions (such as the households of the director of the institution, the physician or the doorkeeper) are also considered as private households.

Social pension insurance: Members of the workers' and employees' old age insurance funds, of the miners' pension insurance fund and of the Pension Fund of German Handicrafts.



II. Population Movement

Explanatory Notes

Marriages, births and deaths are recorded from the enumeration cards made out by the registrars' offices. The number of dissolutions of marriages is determined from the enumeration sheets filled in by the district courts. The records of the realistration offices provide the data on migrations.

Marriages: Civil marriages, incl. of foreigners, except for cases where both spouses are members of the foreign armed forces stationed in the Federal Republic incl. Berlin (West).

Live births: All children who showed such evidence of life as either beating of the heart or pulsation of the umbilical cord or setting-in of the natural respiration of the lungs. Up to the end of 1957 only children whose natural lung respiration had begun.

Foetal deaths: If a product of conception measures a minimum of 35 cm in length and does not show any such evidence of life, it is considered still-born.

Deaths: Foetal deaths, officially registered war deaths and legal declarations of death are not considered as deaths.

Death rates: For computing general death rates, deaths are related to 1,000 living persons of the same age and sex, while for infant mortality the infant deaths are related to 1,000 live births. Changes in the age structure of the population are eliminated for the standardized death rates by uniformly basing them on the age distribution of 1950.

Life table: It shows the current diminution of an aggregate 100,000 men or women under the mortality conditions of the years stated (order of survival) and the average number of years persons of various ages may still expect to live (expectation of life).

Migrations: Moves from one community to another incl. cases where a person moves into another dwelling while keeping the one he had hitherto occupied, or where he gives up this further dwelling and returns to the original one.

Emergency admission: Granted to Germans who had to leave the Soviet-occupied zone of Germany because they were in immediate danger of life and limb, whose personal liberty was in jeopardy or who left for other compelling reasons. Admission may also be a discretionary measure aimed at reuniting families or where there seems to be a sufficient source of subsistence.

III. Public Health

Explanatory Notes

Incapacity or work by types of diseases: The data are collected by the social health insurance funds. For every case of disease involving incapacity for work, the patients under medical treatment — compulsory insurants who are entitled immediately to draw cash benefits — are recorded, indicating the final diagnosis. Deaths not preceded by incapacity for work are not included.

Notifiable diseases: Up to 31 December 1961, the obligation to notify infectious diseases had been regulated by the Ordinance on the Control of Infectious Diseases of 1 December 1938 as issued by the Reich Minister of the Interior. As of 1 January 1962, the catalogue of notifiable infectious diseases has for the first time been extended by virtue of the Federal Law on Epidemics of 18 July 1961 providing for the prevention and control of infectious diseases. For data collection, the so-called "sanitary police reports" of the physicians are drawn upon.

Tuberculosis: The statistics record the persons suffering from tuberculosis as covered by the tuberculosis welfare branches as well as new and total cases registered. The total number of cases comprises all persons registered as suffering from active tuberculosis.

Causes of death: The cause of death is obtained from the medical certificates of cause of death which are made out by the physicians. If two or more morbid conditions contributed to the death, the underlying cause is recorded. The death rates analysed by causes of death are related to 100,000 living persons of the same age and sex. Changes in the age structure of the population are eliminated for the standardized death rates (analysed by causes of death) by uniformly basing them on the age and sex distribution of 1950.

Hospital establishments: Hospital establishments are recorded by economic units. There is a breakdown according to public hospitals, hospitals operated by charitable and similar organisations, and private hospitals.

Medical and ancillary personnel: The sources drawn upon for these data are the lists or card-indexes kept by the public health offices on this group of persons.





IV. Church Affairs, Education and Culture

Explanatory Notes

As there is only little statistical material available on church affairs and the various cultural institutions, the emphasis in this section will be on schools and universities.

Schools providing general education: Primary schools, special schools, intermediate schools, academic high schools (high schools) and "new system" schools.

Primary schools: Attendance is compulsory for all children having completed their 6th year of age. Compulsory education at primary schools extends in most of the federal Laender to 8 years, in Schleswig-Holstein, Hamburg, Bremen, Lower Saxony and Berlin (West) to 9 years. The first 4 (or 6) years at primary school are attended by all children. From the 5th or 7th school year the children may attend other schools or institutions providing general education.

Special schools: Schools for children subject to compulsory education at a primary school who cannot be instructed, or not with sufficient success, at regular schools because of their mental, psychical or physical disposition (e. g. schools for the blind, schools for backward children).

Intermediate and ocademic high schools (high schools): Admission to these institutions presupposes 4 or 6 years of primary schooling in the junior department. The intermediate school (Reafschule) comprises six, the academic high school (high school) nine years of schooling after 4 years of primary school. The leaving certificate of the intermediate school permits to go in for elevated occupations not requiring academic education. The secondary school leaving certificate entitles the holder to enter an academic institution of higher education.

"New system" schools: They are chiefly to be found in the Laender of Hamburg, Bremen and Berlin (West) and comprise in a complex school system all types of schools providing general education. The "Freie Waldorfschulen" are of a similar structure.

Schools providing vocational education: Part-time, full-time and advanced full-time vocational schools incl. engineering schools and institutions for the training of technicians.

Part-time vocational schools: Offering 6 to 12 hours per week of compulsory schooling and running parallel to the occupation. All young people who are apprentices, in some other employment or even unemployed have to attend them after primary school up to the completed 18th year of age or until the completion of the practical vocational training.

Full-time vocational schools: Full-time schools providing a vocational education and comprising courses of at least one year. They are attended instead of the part-time vocational school and serve in particular the purpose of preparing for commercial, clerical and domestic occupations as well as specialized occupations in the field of handicrafts.

Advanced full-time vocational schools: Full-time schools providing a vocational education which are attended by students having completed their 18th year of age. Courses last from half a year to three or even more years. They prepare for occupations requiring a higher qualification.

Engineering schools: By aim and duration of the studies, these are independent full-time vocational schools for technical instruction.

Teacher training colleges and similar institutions: They train teachers for primary schools and schools providing vocational education.

Institutions of higher education: They are divided into academic institutions of higher education and colleges of music, fine arts and physical education.

The academic institutions of higher education comprise universities, technical colleges, academic institutions with university status but only one or few faculties, colleges of theological philosophy and evangelical colleges.

Adult education schools: Further education of adults at evening classes (working groups, courses, lecture series) or by individual activities covering a wide range of subjects. The figures give the number of subscriptions to the various courses because one student may sign up for several subjects.





V. Justice

Explanatory Notes

This section contains data on organisation, personnel and activities of the courts (civil, criminal and administrative courts) as well as on delinquency among the population.

Courts: Information on organisation and cases pending is provided only for the ordinary courts (lower courts, district courts, provincial courts of appeal and the Federal Supreme Court) as well as for labour courts, (general) administrative courts and social courts. There is a joint higher administrative court for Schleswig-Holstein and Lower Saxony.

Judges: Professional judges at all types of courts. The figures relate to the positions occupied at federal and Laender courts; the number of judges is smaller than provided for by the authorized establishment and greater than of judges actually administering justice.

Offences: Comprising only crimes and misdemeanours (Art. 1 of the Penal Code).

Crimes: Acts liable to punishment by penal servitude or confinement for more than five years.

Misdemeanours: Acts liable to punishment by confinement for not more than five years, by imprisonment, by a fine of more than 150.— DM or by fines in general.

Persons brought to trial: Persons of competent age committed for trial whose criminal cases have been definitely disposed of. They comprise persons convicted and persons otherwise dealt with.

Persons convicted: Persons brought to trial who under criminal law have been sentenced to imprisonment (penal servitude, confinement, detention, arrest) or fined or who have been dealt with as juveniles and accordingly subjected to punishment, disciplinary or educational measures.

Other decisions: Court orders on security and correctional measures, dropping of charges, non-conviction, commitment to the guardianship judge, acquittal.

Adults: Persons aged 21 years and over who are subject to criminal law.

Juveniles: Persons aged 14 to under 18 years who are subject to criminal law for juveniles.

Adolescents: Persons aged 18 to under 21 years who may be tried either under criminal law or under criminal law for juveniles.

Jail prisoners: Persons confined to jail under sentence of imprisonment (excl. for instance prisoners held for prosecution).

Persons in preventive custody: Persons detained in execution of a court order on security and correctional measures (e. g. preventive detention, workhouse).





VI. Elections

Explanatory Notes

Elections to the "Bundestag" and the "Landtage" (Hamburg and Bremen: "Buergerschaft"; Berlin (West): "Abgeordnetenhaus") are held every four years. For the "Landtag" of the Saar the period is five years. Persons having completed the 21st year of age are entitled to vote, while completion of the 25th year of age is required for eligibility.

Votes recorded: Proportion of votes valid and void cast by the registered voters.

"Bundestag" election procedure: Part of the members of the "Bundestag" are elected by a (relative) majority vote in constituencies, the other by proportional ballot according to electoral tickets for parties in the individual Laender. Since 1953 every voter has had two votes; he casts the first one for a candidate in the constituency and endorses with the second vote the ticket of a party in his Land.

Apportionment of seats: If tickets of the same parties for several Laender are combined—a practice followed since 1957—first the seats are computed which the parties have gained from second votes cast in the whole polling area. In a second counting of votes the electoral mandates then are further apportioned according to the votes cast for the individual Laender tickets. From the number of parliamentary seats thus obtained the number of seats for constituencies won by the party in the relevant Land is then deducted. If the number of seats gained in constituencies is higher, they all go to the party concerned ("excess seats").

Blocking clause: In order to qualify for the apportionment of seats, a party must poll at least 5% of the votes recorded in the Federal Republic or win in at least three constituencies.

In addition to the candidates directly returned to the "Bundestag", there are another 22 members for the Land of Berlin. They are now elected by the Berlin "Abgeordnetenhaus", since there are still some impediments to the full implementation of the Federal Election Law in Berlin. After the reincorporation of the Soar, its population for the first time participated in the elections of 1957.

Political parties: CDU/CSU (Christlich Demokratische Union/Christlich-Soziale Union) = Christian Democratic Union/Christian Social Union; SPD (Sozialdemokratische Partei Deutschlands) = Social Democratic Party of Germany; FDP (Freie Demokratische Partei) = Free Democratic Party; GDP (Gesamtdeutsche Partei) = All-German Party.

VII. Employment

Explanatory Notes

Data on the employment of the population are derived from various sources. Table 1 contains the results of an estimation which, while also using statistics covering partial fields of economic activity, is based on the figures of the population and occupation censuses of 1950 and 1961 and of the microcensuses taken from 1957 to 1962. Tables 2 to 4 present the results of the Population and Occupation Census, 1961, Tables 5 to 7 of sample surveys of the microcensus. The figures in Table 8 were obtained by special enumerations made from the card files kept for employees by the employment exchanges. Deviations in the results of the microcensus, the censuses and the enumerations based on the card files of the employment exchanges are, among other reasons, due to differences in the groups of persons susceptible of being covered, in the definitions and in the data provided on the employment status, further to the random errors occurring in every sample survey and presumably also to a certain overstatement in the card files enumerated.

Active population: All persons who normally pursue a gainful activity (self-employed, unpaid family workers, dependently employed persons) irrespective of the hours they have to work under their contracts or which they actually worked. The active population consists of economically active persons and persons not gainfully employed.

Non-active population: All persons who do not pursue any gainful activity.

Self-employed: Persons who as proprietors or tenants operate an industrial or commercial establishment or agricultural holding and have both its economic and organisational direction, further all persons with liberal professions.

Unpaid family workers: Family members helping on an agricultural holding or in a non-agricultural establishment operated by a self-employed family member and not being paid any wages or salaries. The number of hours worked in this capacity is not considered for classifying them as unpaid family workers.

Dependently employed persons: Officials and employed persons (salaried employees and wage-earners). Salaried employees include commercial, technical and administrative employees, further student-trainees and improvers, commercial and administrative apprentices. Wage-earners also comprise journeymen, helpers, industrial apprentices and homeworkers.

Unemployed: Unemployed persons registered at employment exchanges.

Persons whose principal means of subsistence accrue from economic activity: Economically active persons who derive their means of subsistence mainly from their gainful activity.

Persons whose principal means of subsistence accrue from unemployment benefits or relief: Economically active persons who, apart from insignificant economic activity, derive their means of subsistence mainly from unemployment benefits or relief and persons not gainfully employed whose means of subsistence are mainly provided for by unemployment benefits or relief.

Persons whose principal means of subsistence accrue from pensions etc.: Economically active and non-active persons as well as persons not gainfully employed who mainly live on income originating from claims due to former employment, from claims accruing to surviving dependents, from pension claims because of war disablement, from public assistance or property, etc.

Persons whose principal means of subsistence accrue from family members: Economically active and non-active persons as well as persons not gainfully employed whose principal means of subsistence are provided for by parents, spouses, children or other members of the family.




SEATS OF PARTIES IN THE 4th GERMAN BUNDESTAG

IX. Agriculture, Forestry, Fisheries Explanatory Notes

Agricultural and forestry holding: Economic unit with a total area of 0.5 hectares and over which is independently handled by the holder and wholly or in part used for purposes of agriculture, forestry or fisheries. Area allowed for use by employed persons is considered part of holding of the employer.

Agriculture outside holdings: Collectively used meadows and pastures owned by communities or other public or private bodies as well as units of landed property consisting only of extensive grazing, litter meadows, fallow land or other areas not utilized.

Principal line of production (PLP): Classification of holdings according to the group of products which—in terms of market value of the products incl. home consumption—represents the main production.

Farm or wood area (total area): Comprises own areas cultivated by the holder, areas leased or taken over for cultivation, excluding those let on lease or operated by others. Included are also areas which are part of the holding and taken up by buildings, farmsteads or lanes, further waste land, waters, etc.

Acreage: Total area of all agricultural and forestry holdings located in the region incl. all other areas if they are not operated by holdings outside the region.

Agricultural area: Comprises arable and garden land, fruit orchards, tree nurseries, meadows and pastures, vineyards and osier-beds.

Labour of agricultural holdings: Persons aged 14 years and over who are occupied on the agricultural holding and in the household of the holder.

Family labour: Holder, members of his family and relatives living with him in the same household.

Permanent hired labour: Hired labour in regular employment at the holding and relatives of the holder who do not live with him in the same household.

Gross production of the soil: Total production of the soil without any deductions for seeds, feed and losses of weight.

Grain equivalent: A ratio calculated for most products of vegetable origin according to the nutritious value, otherwise according to yield conditions (e.g. for vegetables, vines, tobacco, hop) or according to the nutritious value required for such production (products of animal origin).

Sales returns: Receipts from sales of products to other branches of economic activity and directly to consumers. Direct purchases of seeds, breeding stock, feed, etc. by one holding from another are excluded (the same applies to operating expenditure).

Operating expenditure: Cash expenditure excl. wage claims of family labour, personal taxes, immediate assistance levy and remuneration in kind, but incl. expenditure on new construction and extension of farm buildings as well as on new machinery.

Slaughtering weight: Weight of slaughtered and disemboweled animals; cattle without skin, head and limbs separated from the body at specified joints, but with kidneys and suet; pigs with skin, head, feet and fatty portions of the inside.

Deep-sea and inshore fisheries: Catches are recorded in terms of landings of fresh fish. Quantities already processed on board ship (salted fish, frozen fillets, etc.) are converted accordingly.







Explanatory Notes

Local Units

The 1961 Census of Non-Agricultural Local Units covered the local units in nearly all sectors of economy, except for agricultural and forestry holdings as well as for private households in this capacity. They were allocated according to the German Industrial Classification of Economic Activities (1961 Edition). Local units with various activities (combinations) were classified by their "main activity".

Local units: Units where at least one person—incl. the proprietor or manager—was permanently working on a full-time or part-time basis.

Persons engaged: Working proprietors, family workers and all persons dependently employed at the local unit.

Survey of the Cost Structure of Non-Agricultural Enterprises

Cost structure surveys are held every four years on a sample basis consecutively in most sectors of economy. Statistical unit is the entire enterprise. The enterprises are classified by economic activity and allocated in the same way as the local units (see above). The following tables contain preliminary figures for the transport industry in 1959 and for wholesale reade in 1960. For further details see "Statistisches Jahrbuch 1963", pp. 192 ff.

Balance Sheets of Joint-Stock Companies

Number and nominal capital of joint-stock and limited companies are recorded and currently adjusted on the basis of registrations in the Trade Register. Balance-sheet statistics cover commercial balances of joint-stock companies as derived from the obligatory publications in the "Bundesanzeiger". Figures on credit institutions and insurance companies are not included. Annual statements of accounts of communal power supply and transport enterprises are covered by direct inquiries and mainly processed in the same way as those of joint-stock companies.

XI. Industry and Handicrafts

Explanatory Notes

Industry

In general, the data refer to local units employing 10 and more persons, thus covering approximately 9% of the persons engaged and of turnover in industry (excluding construction and power supply industries).

The data for industrial local units are presented according to the principal group of industries involved, i. e. local units with various activities are as a whole assigned to the group of industries which comprises their main activity as determined by the numbers of persons engaged.

Local units, not enterprises.

Persons engaged: Working proprietors and all persons dependently employed at the local unit (salaried employees, wage-earners, apprentices), family workers under an employment contract and, as of 1962, also unpaid family workers if they are working at the local unit at least for one third of the normal hours of work. Homeworkers are excluded.

Manhours worked: All hours actually worked by wage-earners (including industrial apprentices), not the hours paid.

Total wages and salaries: Gross total excl. the employers' obligatory social insurance contributions. Extra pay (and bonuses) included. Not covered are general expenditure for social purposes and emoluments considered as reimbursement of expenses.

Turnover: Turnover of own product (excl. turnover of goods sold as purchased, turnover from sales of waste products, energy, capital goods, etc.). Turnover is based on invoiced values including any excise duties they comprise as well as freight, packaging costs, postage and fees, even if charged separately.

Foreign turnover: Direct transactions of industrial local units with buyers abroad and—where clearly determinable—with German exporters.

Industrial production: The index of industrial net production is computed on a sampling basis, i. e. the figures for the branches of industry are currently adjusted on the basis of selected products the development of which is representative of the overall development. Weight base for the various industrial groups are the 1950 net values of production.

The index of industrial gross production shows the development of output for industrial goods ready to be invested or consumed. Weight base for the various series of products are the 1950 gross values of production.

Figures for the production of selected goods generally relate to commodities or types of commodities intended for sale and manufactured by industrial local units employing 10 and more persons. In some cases (particularly for basic materials), total production — i. e. production intended for sale including production to be further processed at the same unit or other units of the same enterprise—is shown as an aggregate sum. Figures relating to total production have a special mark behind the unit of measure.

Handicrafts

Information on the development of the number of persons engaged and of turnover in handicrafts has since the 3rd quarter of 1960 been provided by the Reports on Handicrafts.

Persons engaged: Working proprietors, family workers as well as all dependently employed persons (journeymen and other wage-earners, salaried employees, apprentices).

Total turnover: Total amount of payments collected or agreed for supplies or services including proceeds from sales of goods sold as purchased as well as from transport services, expertise, meatinspection and other secondary activities.



XII. Construction, Building Activity, Dwellings

Explanatory Notes

The building reports provide information on the main sector of construction, i. e. on building industry proper. It comprises industrial local units and handicraft establishments of the following branches: civil and constructional engineering (incl. road building), special activities such as construction of chimneys, fire places and industrial furnaces, damming and sealing (isolation work), well sinking and deep-boring other than in mining, demolition and blasting work, rubble clearance, stucco, gypsum and plastering trades, carpentry, wood constructions and roofing work. The statistics on building acticity covers the number of permits granted for buildings and dwellings and that of dwellings completed. Dwellings authorized but not yet completed at yearend are recorded in the statistics on non-completions according to stage of construction. Building projects entirely or partly financed from public funds are covered separately by the statistics on building permits. Benchmarks on stocks of buildings and dwellings provided an enumeration of buildings held with the Population and Occupation Census of 6 June 1961. Data on size, installations, equipment and occupancy of dwellings as well as on income and rent of main tenant households were obtained from material of the 1%-Housing Survey of spring 1960.

Persons engaged: Working proprietors and all persons dependently employed in the local unit (salaried employees, wage-earners, apprentices); unpaid family workers.

Total wages and salaries: Gross total excl. employers' social insurance contributions, but incl. payment for legal holidays, vacation, sickness, etc.

Hours worked: Hours actually worked on building sites and building yards.

Turnover: Remuneration for building work in the Federal Republic liable to be reported to the tax and revenue offices.

Residential construction: Buildings primarily serving housing purposes incl. one-dwelling houses and apartment blocks for members of federal armed forces and foreign armed forces stationed in the Federal Republic, as well as creation of dwellings by conversion or extension of buildings and rooms formerly used for other purposes.

Farm construction: Incl. also building work designed to increase agricultural production, e.g. drainage systems.

Commercial and industrial construction: Constructions primarily serving commercial purposes incl. electricity, gas and water works as well as other buildings erected for public authorities and the like.

Public works, construction for transport: Buildings mainly serving central and local government functions (e.g. courthouses, tax and revenue office buildings, barracks, sewers, sports facilities, schools) and those primarily used for transport and communications.

Gross increase of buildings and dwellings: Increase from building activity excl. decrease due to fire, demolition, etc.

Net increase of buildings and dwellings: Increase from building activity minus decrease due to fire, demolition, etc.

Residential buildings: Buildings exclusively, or at least to one half, used for habitation. They comprise one, two and multi-dwelling houses, farmhouses and small-holders' cottages. Residential buildings also include buildings either occupied only at certain times of the year, over the weekend or on certain days of the week, and which have at least 50 m² of floor or 60 m² of covered space.

Dwellings: Self-contained single or connected rooms intended for habitation and located in residential and non-residential buildings if they are suitable for independent housekeeping. They must have their own kitchen or kitchenette and should have a separate entrance. It is irrelevant whether they accommodated one or several households at census date, even if each of these further households had its own cooking facilities. Basement lodgings are not considered as dwellings.

Occupied non-residential buildings: Buildings mainly used for commercial, agricultural, social, cultural or administrative purposes, but which apart from the useful space for their specific purposes also comprise living quarters.

One and two-dwelling houses: Residential buildings with one or two dwellings excl. farmhouses and small-holders' cottages.

Provisional dwellings: Makeshift buildings, barracks, Nissen huts, ships put out of commission, wagons and other vehicles occupied on census date. They also include buildings either occupied only at certain times of the year, over the weekend or on certain days of the week, and which have under 50 m² of floor or 60 m² of covered space.



XIII. Wholesale and Retail Trade, Hotel and Restaurant Industry, Tourism

Explanatory Notes

Census of Distribution, 1960: The tables contain partial results of the census taken for the Federal Republic (excl. the Saar) incl. Berlin (West) on the structure of the hotel and restaurant industry in selected classes of economy.

Statistical unit: Whole enterprises incl. any local units, or parts of such units, not belonging to commerce. In commerce (wholesale trade, commercial agency, retail trade) allocation to the classes of the German Industrial Classification of Economic Activities was made according to the main line of goods carried or procured and in hotel and restaurant industry according to the type of establishment as reported by the enterprises covered (e.g. hotel, inn).

The following tables record only enterprises of which figures are available for the whole business year 1959.

Persons engaged: Working proprietors, family workers and persons employed by the enterprise on a full-time or part-time basis.

Turnover: Value of all goods delivered and services rendered (for commercial agencies the commissions and reimbursements received) by the whole enterprise, incl. any tax-exempt turnover and deductible free allowances, irrespective of the receipt of payment. Not considered as turnover are receipts from letting and leasing of buildings and real estate not belonging to the local unit as well as interest and dividends, proceeds from the sale of fixed assets, transitory items and turnover from activity in liberal professions. Turnover of commodities procured on commission comprises the entire turnover of goods handled in the name and for the account of third parties.

Gross proceeds = Business turnover at selling prices minus available goods at cost prices. — Available goods = goods received plus stocks at the beginning of the business year minus stocks at the end of the business year.

Quick Statistics on Turnover

Wholesale trade: Figures compiled from monthly returns of about 7,500 firms of non-cooperative wholesale trade as well as of purchasing and selling associations. The reporting enterprises are selected from 51 branches of non-cooperative wholesale trade and from 9 branches of cooperative wholesale trade which also comprises some purchasing and selling associations which are no cooperatives.

Relail trade: Figures compiled from monthly returns of about 24,000 enterprises of retail trade with 44,000 sales outlets. From these returns index series on the development of turnover are computed for the major commercial lines, turnover indices for the four categories of commodities: Food, beverages and tobacco — clothing, linen, footwear — household equipment and furnishings — other commodities—, and a turnover index for retail trade as a whole. A separate turnover index is computed for textile goods. Department and low-price stores classify their turnover figures accordingly; they are included among the four categories of commodities. Turnover of cooperative societies is allocated to food, beverages and tobacco. Weight base are the figures of the 1954 Turnover Tax Statistics.

Trade in goods between Berlin (West) and the rest of the Federal Republic: The figures are compiled from the interzonal trade permits used for the trade in goods of Berlin (West) across the zonal border. The figures thus also include the consignments exchanged between Berlin and foreign countries and crossing the zonal border with trade permits as well as the non-invoiced trade in goods between local units of the same firm. Mail and minor consignments as well as air freight shipments up to 20 kg are excluded.

Trade in goods between the currency areas of DM-West and DM-East: The figures are compiled from the data contained in the interzonal trade and purchasing permits handled by the customs agencies. The purchases and deliveries are covered irrespective of the mode of payment. Not included are: used packing material and non-invoiced consignments as well as exports, imports and consignments in transit.

Tourism: In the communities which in the last few years registered 3,000 and more overnights annually, figures on guests registered and overnights as well as on the country of residence are recorded monthly, those on rooms and beds in establishments of the hotel industry annually on 1 April.

XIV. Foreign Trade

Explanatory Notes

Foreign trade statistics, which are generally based on data provided by importers and exporters, show the frontier crossing goods traffic between the report area and foreign countries. The report area covers the territory of the Federal Republic of Germany (up to 5 July 1959 excl. the Saar) incl. Berlin (West). Trade in goods with the currency area of DM-East is not included in foreign trade statistics.

The export figures contained in this section differ from the data on foreign turnover of industrial local units on page 75. Foreign turnover of industrial local units comprises, for instance, only direct sales to buyers abroad and — where clearly determinable — sales to German exporters; the values are based on ex factory prices; the report area does not comprise Berlin; the commodities are grouped according to the "Commodity Classification for Industry Statistics".

The figures shown in the following tables relate to special trade. This includes direct imports of commodities and imports of foreign commodities from warehouse (since 1962: customs storage warehouse and free port store)

into free circulation, for active improvement (processing of goods for account of persons within the country and job processing), after passive improvement and as ships' and aircraft stores of outward-bound German sea-going vessels and aircraft

as well as exports of commodities

out of free circulation, after active improvement (processing of goods for account of persons within the country and job processing), for passive improvement and as ships' and aircraft stores of outward-bound foreign sea-going vessels and aircraft.

Grouping of commodities in Tables 2 to 4 according to the classification "Commodity Groups and Sub-Groups of Food Production, Trade and Industry" and in Table 5 according to the "Classification for Statistics and Tariffs for International Trade (CST)".

The figures of Table 6 have been computed by allocating the numbers of the Commodity Classification for Foreign Trade Statistics to the corresponding commodity groups and branches of the Commodity Classification for Industry Statistics. By classifying the commodities according to spheres of production, those commodities are brought together which were produced of the same raw materials and with the same production techniques. The spheres of production do not provide any indications as to the shares of investment goods and consumer goods in foreign trade of the Federal Republic. Major consumer goods (e.g. television sets and refrigerators) are for instance recorded as electrical goods in the sphere of investment-goods industries.

The indicated values generally relate to the frontier crossing value, i. e. to the value free at border of the report area, for imports excluding German import duties.

Contrary to the current values (see preceding paragraph), the volume has been computed a posteriori. It is determined by recording the quantities reported per commodity number for the period under review at the unit value (value per quantity unit) of 1960. Therefore the volume represents the value as it would have been if the unit values (prices) of 1960 had remained unchanged during the periods under review.

As areas of purchase and sale are recorded in Table 7 the countries of production or of consumption and in Table 8 also the countries of sale or of purchase.

For detailed methodological explanations see the publications of Subject-Matter Series G: Foreign Trade.





XV. Transport and Communications.

Explanatory Notes

Passenger transport: The statistics present transport cases, i. e. multiple counts are made for one and the same person if carried several times. Passenger transport by inland waterways craft is not covered statistically. One passenger-kilometre is performed by carrying a person over a distance of 1 kilometre.

Goods transport: For goods transport, too, transport cases are counted, but multiple counts are much less frequent. The goods carried in the various branches of transport are presented according to the uniform "Classification of Goods for Transport Statistics", 1962. Edition, which has been effective since 1 January 1962. Unless otherwise stated, the weight of the goods carried is given as gross weight in tons. One ton-kilometre is performed if goods weighing one ton are carried over a distance of 1 kilometre. Only ton-kilometres performed inside the Federal Republic are included.

Railways

Data on length of lines, rolling stock and traffic performance have been derived from the operating statistics of the German Federal Railways. Statistics on transportation of goods by rail are restricted to wagon loads and comprise the goods carried by the German Federal Railways and other railways.

Inland waterways transport

The number of inland waterways craft is determined annually by current adjustments based on a count of inland waterways craft held on 1 January 1950; a revision was made in 1961.

Ocean-going traffic of inland harbours is shown both in statistics on inland waterways transport and on sea-borne shipping. Inland harbours are those situated upstream of Emmerich, Haren, Bremen, Hamburg and Luebeck.

Sea-borne shipping

The statistics on sea-borne shipping cover the number and cargo capacity of ships entering and clearing coastal ports for "trade purposes". Sea-borne transport comprises every voyage either made entirely outside the territorial waters or leaving them.

The statistics on goods carried in sea-borne shipping cover the seawise receipts and shipments of goods in the various ports. Sea-borne transport of inland harbours is also included.

The gross register tonnage (G.R.T.) represents the capacity of the total closed-in space of a vessel. Net register tonnage (N.R.T.) is the size of the cargo capacity (1 register ton = 2.832 m³).

Road transport

The road network used by motor vehicles consists of classified and communal roads. After the war, the length of communal roads was first ascertained for 1956 and later according to the position as of 1 lanuary 1961.

The number of motor vehicles is determined by the Federal Office for Motor Transport from a cardindex based on the current reports of the registration offices. Short-distance transport by motor lorries is not yet recorded statistically. The payload of a motor lorry or trailer is the maximum quantity of goods which the vehicle is permitted to carry.

Road traffic accidents

A road traffic accident has to be reported if persons have been injured or killed or if there is properly damage due to the traffic on public roads and places. The statistical data are collected by the police. According to the nature of the accident, one or several causes are recorded, though without giving the principal cause.

Persons killed: Persons who were killed outright or died within 30 days in consequence of the accident. Persons injured: Persons who were immediately hospitalized (seriously injured persons) or who in spite of injury were able to leave the place of accident unassisted (slightly injured persons).

Dinalina

Data relate only to the pipeline system and the transportation of crude petroleum within the Federal Republic.

Air transport

Data relate to commercial passenger, freight and mail traffic at the airports of the Federal Republic incl. Berlin (West). As of 1959, the figures on take-offs and landings also cover non-commercial air traffic (alliders excluded).

Federal Postal Administration

Figures on facilities and performance incl. radio and television have been derived from the operating statistics of the Federal Postal Administration.







XVI. Money and Credit

Explanatory Notes

Note and coin circulation: Bank notes issued by the German Federal Bank and Federal Government divisional coin incl. credit institutions' cash holdings of notes and coin.

Foreign exchange: Balances of the German Federal Bank at foreign banks and money-market investments abroad, foreign notes and coin, foreign bills and cheques as well as credits to international institutions and consolidation loans to foreign central banks.

Major balance-sheet items of the credit institutions: Data are derived from the monthly returns of the credit institutions for the money and credit statistics compiled by the German Federal Bank.

Savings deposits at building and loan associations: Savings accounts balances earmarked for specific purposes.

Housing premiums: Government funds for the promotion of residential construction provided for savers at building and loan associations under the Housing Premium Law of 17 March 1952 (and the laws amending it). The premiums are graduated according to the marital status of the saver, the maximum amount being at present 400 DM a year.

Average prices of fixed-interest-bearing securities: For each category of securities the average prices are computed for selected bonds from the prices as quoted on four return dates of each month.

Average share prices: The average prices are computed for all ordinary shares quoted on stock exchanges for companies registered which have their seat in the Federal Republic excl. Berlin. Data are weighted with the original capital of the companies covered.

Yield: The yield represents the ratio of dividend to share price.

Index of share prices: The index is computed from the quotations of 430 selected companies which have their seat in the Federal Republic excl. Berlin. Data are weighted with the original capital, weight base being the prices as quoted on 31 December 1953. In the case of capital increases for which a subscription right was offered to the shareholders, the fall in share prices due to marking ex subscription rights have been eliminated.

Foreign exchange rate is the price quoted on stock exchanges which indicates how many domestic currency units may be obtained, or have to be paid, in exchange for a specific amount in the foreign currency (as a rule 100 units). Middle market price is the mean value between buying rate and selling rate.

Bankruptcies and insolvencies: Data are derived from reports of the lower courts (bankruptcy courts) on bankruptcy proceedings instituted or petitions dismissed for insufficiency of assets as well as on insolvency proceedings instituted.





XVII. Insurance

Explanatory Notes

This section presents only data on company results and investments of individual insurance. It covers insurance companies which have their registered seats or main offices in the Federal Republic incl. Berlin (West) and the entire business they conduct at home and abroad.

For the presentation of results it is distinguished between insurance companies and lines of insurance (branches). The latter are determined by the type of risk to be borne by the insurance company. Part of the insurance companies do business only in one line (specialized institutions). Frequently the sphere of business of a company extends, however, to several lines of insurance (combination of branches). This applies in particular to indemnity and accident insurance.

No such distinction has, however, been made for investments. The figures relate to investments of the companies.

XVIII. Social Security Schemes

Explanatory Notes

Social health insurance: Compulsory insurants are wage-earners, apprentices and salaried employees with a monthly income of up to 660 DM as well as the great majority of recipients of social insurance pensions. Insurants may voluntarily continue to insure when no longer liable to do so.

pensions. Insurants may voluntarily continue to insure which to longer litable to use.

Benefits: Medical treatment, medicaments, hospital and nursing care, maternity benefits, death benefits for the insured and members of their families, sickness payments and out-patients' allowances for insurants.

Legal accident insurance: Insured are all persons in an employment or service relationship, apprentices and the major part of the self-employed and the unpaid family workers.

Benefits in the case of industrial injuries and occupational diseases: Medical treatment and nursing care, sickness payments, pensions and other payments in cash and in kind to injured and sick persons, surviving dependents' pensions.

Workers' old age insurance funds: Compulsory insurants are all wage-earners. Insurants may voluntarily continue to insure when no longer liable to do so or increase the insurance.

Benefits: Measures designed to maintain, improve and restore the earning capacity; pensions paid to persons incapable for work, old age and surviving dependents' pensions.

Employees' old age insurance funds: Compulsory insurants are all salaried employees with a monthly salary of up to 1,250 DM and certain liberal professions. Otherwise as under workers' old age insurance funds.

Miners' pension insurance funds: Compulsory insurants are persons employed in mining, i. e. all wage-earners as well as salaried employees with a monthly salary of up to 1,250 DM. Insurants may voluntarily continue to insure when no longer liable to do so or increase the insurance.

Benefits: Measures designed to maintain, improve and restore the earning capacity; pensions paid to underground workers (new system) because of partial disability to work in mines and miners' pensions in the case of complete disability, miners' retirement benefits, surviving dependents' pensions.

Farmers' old age pension funds: Unless exempt, all farmers are liable to pay contributions.

Benefits: Old age payments (under certain conditions) for former farmers and their surviving spouses.

Unemployment insurance: Covering all employed persons liable to insurance for possible sickness or under the Employees' insurance Law.

Benefits: Unemployment pay to persons unemployed and entitled to draw benefits, compensation for wages lost, measures designed to prevent or terminate unemployment.

Unemployment relief: Public relief granted to unemployed persons able and willing to work who are not entitled to unemployment pay and in need of assistance.

Assistance scheme for war victims: Eligible for a pension are war-disabled and surviving dependents of war victims.

Benefits: Medical treatment, aid to war victims, disablement pensions, basic and equalisation pensions paid to widows and orphans, parents' pensions, allowances for nursing care, compensation for occupational detriment, funeral allowances, lump sum indemnification and indemnification paid upon marriage.

Equalisation of burdens (public relief and compensation payments): Eligible are expellees and persons who suffered damage because of the war or in connection with the currency.

Benefits: Basic compensation, war damage pensions, compensation for household equipment, accommodation assistance, currency conversion compensation, compensation for holders of "old savings", training grants, loans and other promotive measures.

Family allowance funds: Economically active persons (dependently and self-employed) and nonactive persons are eligible for children's allowances for the third and each subsequent child, provided they are not entitled to such payments as members of the public service or as recipients of social benefits. Since 1 April 1961, children's allowances from federal funds have also been paid for the second child under the Law on the Children's Allowance Fund of 18 July 1961.

Public assistance: Under the public assistance scheme, one-time or current relief payments are made to needy persons who cannot finance the necessities of life from their own resources or incomes. Assistance is also provided in institutions and homes or similar establishments.

Public youth welfare: Measures taken by the relevant agencies for the promotion of youth welfare, in particular supervision of illegitimate and foster children, official guardianships, protective care or educational assistance for morally endangered youths, assistance rendered with adoptions and affiliations, social assistance in juvenile courts, voluntary educational assistance and correctional eduction under a court order.

XIX. Finance and Taxes

Explanatory Notes

The data on revenue and expenditure of central and local government are derived from the annual budget statistics (Federal Government and communal finance). Figures on cash tax revenue are obtained from statistics conducted on a monthly and quarterly basis by the Federal Ministry of Finance and from quarterly statistics on communal finance. Data on budget revenue and expenditure of the Federal Government for 1961 to 1964 have been derived from the reports of the Federal Ministry of Finance. Information on the personnel of federal authorities and enterprises is provided by the surveys on personnel conducted annually on 2 October. The indebtedness of the Federal Government, the Laender and communities is ascertained annually on 31 December by the survey on the indebtedness of central and local government.

Direct expenditure: Total expenditure excl. grants, loans and redemption payments to central and local government, for the whole range of functions also less reimbursements (settlements between administrative branches within the budgets of central and local government).

Expenditure on capital transactions: Expenditure entailing changes in net assets (granting of loans, redemption payments, amounts placed to reserves and to capital, participations, acquisition of real estate and movable assets, new construction and reconstruction, extensions and conversions, major repairs).

Special resources: Revenue accruing to, and earmarked for, administrative branches (functions), e.g. fees and remunerations, rents, proceeds from investments, borrowings and proceeds of sales.

General resources: General budget revenue, in particular tax receipts and proceeds from earning assets.

Wage tax, income tax and corporation tax statistics: The last results available are those for 1957. They were published in the 1961 Handbook of Statistics.

Property tax statistics: The assessed taxpayers were recorded from copies of the tax assessments.

Statistics on standard values of working assets: Commercial local units, for which a standard value has been established for 1 January 1960, were covered on the basis of copies of assessment notices.

Turnover tax: The 1962 turnover tax statistics, conducted on the basis of data derived from advance turnover tax returns, provides figures on the number of taxpayers, total turnover, turnover tax and since 1954 again on taxable and tax-free turnover as well as on legal forms.

Excise duties: The figures on tax revenue give the nominal receipts. Because of the time factor and for other reasons they therefore deviate from the cash tax revenue. The consumer goods taxed do not constitute the total sales. There must be added the untaxed quantities which are covered by the excise duty statistics, but do not figure in Table 12.

Trade tax: The trade tax statistics which was for the first time conducted in 1958 on the basis of copies of trade tax and fiscal reallocation assessments, provides results on the number of taxpayers, their bases of taxation and on the nominal taxes.





XX. Prices

Explanatory Notes

Price statistics provide information on both level and trends of prices at the individual stages of the movement of goods in the various sectors of economy as well as of commercial performance of every kind. The assessment of the price level is dependent on the type and quality of the commodity or performance, the marketing stage (producer's price, consumer price, etc.), the freight conditions (ex factory's free domicile, etc.), the location of the market, the area of application of the prices, the quantities purchased (quantity discount), the terms of payment, etc.

One of the main purposes of price statistics is the comparison of trends in the economic process. The construction of index series on the basis of the trends of individual prices is in this connection of special importance. It is indispensable if one wants to get a general idea of the price movements in a specific sphere, e. g. in agriculture, industry or retail trade. This entails, however, certain difficulties with regard to the interpretation of the indices.

In principle, prices must be comparable in point of time, i. e. they must always relate to the same type, quality, marketing stage, freight conditions, etc. In statistical work endeavours are therefore made to adjust the computed price indices for irregularities due to changes in the condition of the commodities as well as in the terms of distribution and delivery. A price index also has to consider the same quantities of all individual commodities at the various dates of computation, since otherwise the price index would, not show exclusively the average change in prices as such. But as in practice the structure of turnover, which serves as the basis for determining the weighting (shopping basket) of an index, changes over the years, this affects the utility of the general index and of the group indices in providing information for longer periods. Therefore the selection of commodities and the weighting pattern of the indices should be revised from time to time.

Computed are indices of purchase prices (e.g. purchase prices for foreign goods, for farm supplies, consumer prices) and of selling prices (e.g. of agricultural products, of industrial products and of retail trade). There are so far indices for the following stages and sectors, the most important of which have been included in this section:

Producers' prices for industrial products

Producers' prices for agricultural products

Producers' prices for forestry products (raw wood)

Prices of selected basic materials (they show the development of purchase prices for domestic and foréign raw materials and semi-finished products which enter production)

Purchase prices for foreign goods and selling prices for export goods

Purchase prices for farm supplies (commodities and services excl. wages)

Prices for services in residential, non-residential and road construction (they show the movement of purchase prices paid by the investors and at the same time the selling prices of the building contractors)

Selling prices in retail trade

Purchase prices paid by private households for commodities and services ("Consumer Price Index")

Various special indices are also computed, while others are in preparation.

Prices for building land which have been collected for the first time in the last few years, and for which so far an index has not yet been computed, have also been included. These are purchase and selling prices for various interested parties.



XXI. Wages and Salaries

Explanatory Notes

Actual Earnings

The figures recorded in this section for weekly hours worked, gross hourly and weekly earnings of workers, as well as for gross monthly earnings of salaried employees, are averages per worker or salaried employee.

Current survey of earnings in industry and commerce: This sample survey is held for the months of February, May, August and November of every year according to the payroll procedure. The conceptual distinction between workers (wage-earners) and salaried employees is made in accordance with the approach followed by social security. Workers (wage-earners) are all dependently employed persons liable to be insured in the workers' old age insurance funds, or would be if their earnings did not exceed the limit of compulsory insurance or if they were not exempt from insurance due to special regulations. Only persons employed on a full-time basis and during the whole report period at the local units covered are included in the survey.

Workers

Qualification group 1: Workers who because of their technical knowledge and skill perform work which is particularly difficult, highly responsible or complex.

Qualification group 2: Workers mostly employed in one particular line of activity and performing regularly recurring or less difficult and responsible work for which no general vocational qualification is required.

Qualification group 3: Workers doing simple and more or less auxiliary work which does not require any technical training or vocational education whatsoever.

Salaried employees

Qualification group II: Commercial and technical employees with special experience performing independent functions in a responsible position with a restricted power of disposition; they appoint employees of other activity groups and are responsible for their instruction.

Qualification group III: Commercial and technical employees with several years' experience or special technical knowledge and abilities or performing specialized tasks; they work independently and have to go by the general directions given, but are not responsible for the work done by others.

Qualification group IV: Commercial and technical employees without the power to decide independently, who perform simple tasks which require a completed vocational education or technical knowledge gained by several years' practice, the completion of studies at an advanced full-time vocational school or private studies.

Qualification group V: Commercial and technical employees doing simple or routine work which does not require any vocational education.

For technical reasons, managerial employees with full power of supervision and disposition (qualification groups is and ib) and apprentices are not covered.

For workers are recorded the "weekly hours worked" and the "weekly hours paid". Hours worked are the hours actually performed at the working place, i.e. as a rule the time spent "behind the time clock" (within the local unit or at the working place) less the general breaks (such as lunch-hour and breakfast).

"Weekly hours paid" are the "weekly hours worked" plus the "paid hours lost", e. g. for legal holidays, paid leave, paid breaks in work, paid dead time for business and personal reasons (meetings or celebrations of the staff, consultations of a doctor, family reunions, etc.).

As gross earnings are considered the wages or salaries contracted by collective bargaining or free agreement including agreed and other efficiency premiums, welfare allowances and other extra pay and allowances as they are actually calculated as wage earnings of the employee during the collection period.

Survey of earnings in handicrafts: It is conducted according to the same methodological principles followed in the "current survey of earnings in industry and commerce", but only for the months of May and November of every year.

Journeymen: All workers who passed the journeyman's examination as well as those employed persons who have not taken such an examination, but are engaged as skilled workers and can be assimilated to "journeymen" because of their experience, training or education.

Senior journeymen: Journeymen who are at least graded in the wage group of the corner rate (100%) as contracted by collective bargaining, moreover, qualified journeymen who receive extra pay in addition to the corner rate (e. g. head journeymen, foremen, masters paid by the hour).

Junior journeymen: Journeymen whose pay because of their low age or due to the short time they have worked so far in the occupation is subject to deductions from the corner rate in accordance with the wage agreement.

Other workers: All workers who because of their vocational training and the functions they perform cannot be considered as "journeymen" in the line of the enterprise (e.g. semi-skilled workers, unskilled workers, drivers, workmen doing other work than the handicraft work typical of the enterprise at which they are employed).

Agreed Wages and Salaries

Index of agreed hourly wages and monthly salaries: The indices are based on a selection of the principal collective and single-plant agreements in force. Each of these agreements is represented by the highest and the lowest wage or salary groups as well as by others which comprise a greater number of persons.

The wage and salary rates used for the index computation are the agreed real time rates per hour for workers in the highest age range of the wage scale or for salaried employees the agreed ultimate salaries in the highest locality class. Extra pay and allowances of any kind as well as piece-rates are not considered.

Monthly salaries of Federal Government officials and public service employees

Salary groups of public service employees: la Permanent representatives of medical superintendents in hospital establishments and homes if the chief physician has steadily to supervise at least eleven fulltime physicians. Ib Employees who are graduates from an academic institution of higher education and distinguished from group II by the special difficulties and importance of their functions or due to their highly qualified performance in a particularly difficult field of activity. Il Employees who are graduates from an academic institution of higher education and distinguished from group III by particularly responsible activities. Ill Employees who are graduates from an academic institution of higher education and perform corresponding tasks. IVa Technical employees in a particularly responsible position and employees distinguished from group IVb by the special difficulties and importance of their functions. IVb Employees distinguished from group Vb by the particularly responsible work they perform. Va Technical employees with a completed intermediary education distinguished from group VIa by particular efficiency. Vb Employees with thorough and comprehensive professional knowledge in their field of activity as well as thorough and extensive knowledge of other related fields who are primarily working indepedently. Vc Masters. Vla Technical employees with a completed intermediary education and a good record of several years' occupational activities. VIb Employees with thorough and extensive professional knowledge who to a large extent work independently. VII Employees with thorough professional knowledge. VIII Employees performing difficult work. IX Employees with simpler functions, typists, telephone operators. X Employees doing mainly routine work.

XXII. Supply and Consumption

Explanatory Notes

Figures on the supply of selected industrial and agricultural products are available from production and foreign trade statistics (production + imports — exports = quantities available). Approximate data for the consumption of food, beverages and tobacco are provided by excise duty statistics.

Information on the consumption by specific population groups, which is however not to be equated with the average consumption by the population as a whole, is furnished by the family budget inquiries held in selected households. They provide figures on the level and composition of income and expenditure as well as on the quantities of food consumed. The figures of family budget inquiries recorded in this section relate to 4-person households of wage and salary earners of a medium consumer group. A medium consumer group comprises households with an average monthly consumption expenditure of between 200 and 350 DM in 1950. These limits have since been currently adapted to the development of the average employee income and to the price level of goods and services for private consumption. Early in 1962, the equipment of the households with durable consumer goods was for the first time recorded in the initial interviews for the 1962/63 Sample Survey on Income and Expenditure. The sample surveys on income and expenditure are designed to investigate throughout a whole year the income and expenditure of households of all social groups, income brackets and of every size. The Sample Survey on Income and Expenditure, 1962/63, was the first of these surveys which are regularly to be conducted at three to five years' intervals

XXIII. National Accounts

Explanatory Notes

The national product represents, in summary form, the economic output of a national economy, i. e. of the permanent residents (persons and institutions) of a given country. However, these "residents" partly perform their economic activity "abroad", while, on the other hand, also "non-residents" economically active "in the country". The economic output generated within the borders of the area specified in the tables — domestic product — therefore differs from the national product by the earned income and the income from property accruing to "residents" from the "rest of the world", less the corresponding income accruing to "non-residents in the country".

The national product and the domestic product may be computed both on a "gross" and a "net" basis, in the latter case after providing for depreciation due to wear and tear at replacement cost. The items may be valued at market prices or — after subtraction of the taxes deductible for the calculation of profits (indirect taxes) and addition of government subsidies paid for the current production — at factor cost. Moreover, the presentation of the various elements of the national product at constant prices permits to indicate whether and to what an extent the development at current prices is due to changes in prices or quantities.

The industrial origin of the national product is computed by considering the contributions made by the various industries to the domestic product. Where these contributions are made by enterprises, the computations are generally based on the gross value of production, i. e. the value of current sales of goods and services (incl. goods sold as purchased and the consumption of entrepreneurs), the changes in stocks of semi-finished and finished goods from own production as well as own-account construction. The contribution to the gross domestic product at market prices is obtained by subtracting from the gross value of production the so-called intermediate goods and services; these are goods and services (incl. goods sold as purchased) received from other economic units and used for production purposes. By further deducting depreciation and indirect taxes - less the subsidies received - one obtains the contribution to the net domestic product at factor cost (net value added), i. e. the aggregate earned income and income from property generated in the sector. Most of the output "produced" by the general government (central and local government and social security) is however not "sold" but provided to the general public without specific compensation. Therefore, the contribution of these institutions to the domestic product can be computed only by way of the "production cost" rather than from the value of "sales"; it represents the aggregate income accruing to the persons employed by these institutions (incl. members of the armed forces) plus an imputed net rent for the use of own buildings as well as depreciation and the indirect taxes paid, if any. Only the output of outside labour employed by these institutions is practically considered as contribution of private households and private non-profi institutions.

The distribution of national income (net national product at factor cost) — i. e. of the aggregate earned income and income from property accruing to "residents" — is presented according to the two sources of income, i. e. "income from employment" and "income from entrepreneurship and property", as well as by groups of income receivers. It is distinguished between "private households" (incl. private non-profit institutions), "incorporated enterprises" and "general government". Therefore, the income of private households from entrepreneurship and property comprises also the undistributed profits of unincorporated enterprises.

On the appropriation side of the national product, private consumption expenditure includes the purchases of goods and services by private households for consumption purposes and the own consumption of private non-profit institutions. The purchases of private households also include, among others, the own consumption of the entrepreneurs and the rental value of owner-occupied dwellings. Government consumption expenditure also comprises, apart from current expenditure on personnel and materials, the gross rents for buildings owned and used by the general government and the expenditure on durable military equipment and constructions. Fixed asset formation also includes self-produced durable capital goods, construction work begun and major repairs involving an appreciation, while non-durable goods of little value are excluded. The changes in stocks consist of changes in stocks of raw materials and supplies as well as of semi-finished and finished goods valued at replacement cost.

The difference between exports and imports of goods and services is referred to as "net exports of goods and services". Imports and exports comprise also non-military transfers between governments, consumption expenditure of "residents abroad" and vice versa, as well as earned income and income from property paid in both directions.



Explanatory notes: The balance of payments provides in summary form a picture of the economic transactions between residents and non-residents. The balance of current transactions presents the turnover in goods and services, showing as the balance net exports (+) or imports (—). The transfers are the balancing entries to the net movements of goods and capital, the balance being the net transfers from abroad (+) or to abroad (—). The balance of capital transactions finally comprises the short-term and long-term capital movements of the private and the government sectors, which are recorded in the form of changes in the various types of assets and liabilities. The balance represents the increase (+) or decrease (—) of net foreign assets.
